

arriet is from Yorkshire, James is from Suffolk, but they live in Bermuda. Life there is good, but during Covid, both came to realise just how much they missed family back home, and how deeply entrenched their roots were here. 'We hatched a plan to find a home-from-home in the UK, to return to whenever possible,' explains Harriet.

In search of muddy dog walks and all-day fishing trips, their pin dropped in the Suffolk village of Pettistree. 'James grew up close by,' says Harriet. 'It's got the lot in terms of rural charms – a 13th-century church, a village green, an award-winning pub. There are even bell ringers!'

The dilapidated Tudor farmhouse they'd bought was, however, a challenge. Harriet was managing the project online from Bermuda, using a local Suffolk architecture firm. At the point where the building work was complete enough to think about decorating, she cajoled interior designer, Sean Symington, to step in.

'He was a hard nut to crack. He's based in the West, the house was in the East, so the journey time was horrendous. But he agreed to do a consultation, despite there being no one to show him around. He called later and said, "If you let me gather and store everything here in Bath, then allow me to fit it in one go, I'll do it." I was relieved and delighted.'

Despite already having been fully renovated, the house was rather bland at that point, with white walls and oak flooring. 'We did a full-on finishing off job,' says Sean. 'Harriet wanted warmth, colour and cosiness. Her brief was, "fresh for summer, but cosy enough for the winter. Not too velvety and pub-like, but still

multi-layered – a look to work in all seasons". So the vision was to create a classic feel without stuffy formality, lifting the heavy woodwork and original beams with vibrant colours and charming patterns that bring a sense of joy and warmth.'

Sean describes the old house as 'thrillingly higgledy-piggledy-from the drawing room to the kitchen is probably a five-minute walk down some stairs, through four rooms, then round a couple of corners. It's not practical but it is so, so charming.' And in need of many crafty design solutions. The sitting room, for example, has a scheme of teal blue, green and yellow, with intentionally uneven design elements to create a space that feels as if it has evolved naturally over time.

Green and raspberry – Harriet's favourite shades – weave their way through nearly every room, scores of fabrics and prints whisper bold design confidence, while a mix of 'old-fashioned' brown furniture and the occasional contemporary piece lands on just the right side of eclectic.


'Pops of colour, a bit of gloss, some fun stripes – these are the things that ensure a traditional property still brings the zing,' says Sean.'We did the install in one very long day, during a heatwave in July. It's not the conventional way to decorate a house, but I'm delighted to say, it worked!'
